Sorting Games

A skill to get your child ready for kindergarten includes being able to sort items. Preschoolers learn to sort one trait at a time. Some of the ways to sort items include by color, size, and shape. Kids love to sort, so try some of these fun activities:

Fill a bucket with a mixture of items - Use items like plastic alphabet letters, play food, crayons, and blocks. Then, make a game out of finding items by:

- Color Put all the red blocks in the bucket.
- Size Find all the biggest blocks first.
- Shape Which ones are shaped like a square?
- Name What are the blue ones named?

Spoons - Plastic spoons come in a variety of colors. Offer a utensil holder or a small cup for sorting each spoon color. This game is good for building fine motor skills and for eye-hand coordination too.

Stickers - Make a simple book by putting a sticker of a different color or shape on each page. Ask your child to stick their stickers onto the page that matches.

Skittles - Sort a bag of Skittles by separating each color into a different cup.




